



Testing: the most stringent requirements

The watches entered in the Competition undergo four months of remorseless testing, without being returned to the watchmakers. They undergo the chronometric certification tests three times, with harsh impact and magnetic exposure tests in between.

These tests are conducted in collaboration with

- · The Official Swiss Chronometer Testing Institute (COSC)
- · The Besançon Observatory
- · Haute Ecole Arc Engineering Department (HE-Arc)
